



# INDIGENOUS CHILD DEVELOPMENT CENTER 'HEROES OF TOMORROW'

#### RESUME

The "Heroes of Tomorrow" Indigenous Children's Development Center is a pioneering initiative in the Colombian Amazon basin, aimed at strengthening the comprehensive development of 500 Ticuna indigenous children, focusing on ages between 5 and 18 years. This project, led by the Bosque Colombiana Foundation under the direction of Nadia Paola Rodriguez Mendoza, M.A., is proposed as a multifaceted response to the emerging challenges of climate change, gender inequality, and educational and nutritional gaps in the region.

With an estimated investment of \$200,000 over a 5-year period, the center seeks to implement programs that encompass sustainable nutrition, environmental and cultural education, and psychosocial well-being. It is estimated that 60% of direct beneficiaries have malnutrition problems, while 70% face barriers in accessing quality education. The program is structured around three fundamental pillars: Nutrition and Health, Education and Culture, and Empowerment and Resilience.

The Nutrition and Health pillar will focus on improving nutritional status through food programs based on local and sustainable diets, complemented by nutrition workshops for families. In the area of Education and Culture, an intercultural and bilingual educational curriculum will be implemented, with emphasis on environmental knowledge and sustainable practices. Finally, the Empowerment and Resilience pillar will focus on the development of leadership skills and self-esteem, with special attention to gender equality and support for vulnerable groups.

This plan not only seeks to positively impact the lives of Ticuna children, but also the community as a whole, promoting sustainable and equitable development. The Colombian Forest Foundation hopes that this center will become a replicable model for other indigenous communities in Colombia and throughout the Amazon region.



#### INTRODUCTION

The 'Heroes of Tomorrow' Indigenous Child Development Center, located in the Colombian Amazon basin, represents an unprecedented effort to address the comprehensive needs of approximately 500 Ticuna indigenous children, in an age range of 5 to 18 years. This project, led by the Bosque Colombiana Foundation and directed by Nadia Paola Rodriguez Mendoza, M.A., is framed in a context of multifaceted challenges, including malnutrition, educational gaps, gender inequality and the impacts of climate change.

The Amazon region, home to the Ticuna community, faces a series of unique environmental and social challenges. Climate change has exacerbated the vulnerability of water resources, affecting agriculture and food security. Recent studies indicate that around 60% of children in the community have some degree of malnutrition, which has a negative impact on their physical and cognitive development. At the same time, limited access to quality education that respects and values indigenous culture is a significant barrier, with approximately 70% of children facing difficulties in this area.

The 'Heroes of Tomorrow' Center is proposed as a comprehensive solution, with a projected budget of \$2 million dollars for the next 5 years. The plan is structured around three fundamental pillars: Nutrition and Health, Education and Culture, and Empowerment and Resilience. Each pillar has been designed to specifically and effectively address the identified challenges, ensuring a holistic and sustainable approach.

In the Nutrition and Health pillar, the objective is to improve the nutritional status of children through the implementation of feeding programs that incorporate local and sustainable diets. School and community gardens are planned to be established that will not only provide nutritious food, but also serve as educational tools to teach sustainable agricultural practices. In addition, nutrition workshops will be held for families, in order to promote healthy eating habits at home.

The Education and Culture pillar focuses on developing an intercultural and bilingual educational curriculum that integrates environmental knowledge and sustainable practices, respecting and valuing the rich Ticuna culture. This approach seeks not only to improve educational quality, but also to strengthen children's cultural identity and connection with their natural environment.

Finally, the Empowerment and Resilience pillar aims to develop leadership skills and self-esteem in children, with a particular focus on gender equality and supporting vulnerable groups. Through workshops, recreational activities and spaces for dialogue, we seek to foster a sense of agency and capacity in children so that they can become agents of change in their communities.

This plan not only aims at the immediate development of Ticuna children, but also at creating a sustainable and replicable model that can be adapted to other indigenous communities in Colombia and the Amazon region. The Bosque Colombiana Foundation, with the support of the Smurfit Kappa Foundation and other collaborators, is committed to making the 'Heroes of Tomorrow' Center a benchmark in indigenous child development, marking a milestone in the fight for environmental justice, gender equity, gender and sustainability in the region.



#### MATERIALS AND METHODS

#### Conceptual and Methodological Framework

The 'Heroes of Tomorrow' Indigenous Child Development Center is based on a comprehensive approach that combines sustainable development practices, intercultural education, nutrition and psychosocial well-being. This approach is based on the understanding that child development is a multifaceted process that requires a holistic intervention adapted to the specific needs of the Ticuna community.

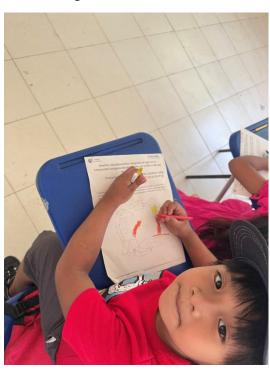
#### **Target population**

The program is designed to serve 500 Ticuna indigenous children, ages 5 to 12. An initial census will be carried out to identify direct beneficiaries, considering factors such as nutritional status, access to education and socioeconomic conditions.



#### **Infrastructure and Resources**

- Construction of Facilities: A complex will be built that will include classrooms, workshop spaces, a kitchen and dining room, and play areas. Construction costs are estimated at approximately \$500,000.
- Equipment: Educational materials, kitchen and dining room equipment, furniture and technological resources will be purchased, with an estimated budget of \$200,000.
- Human Resources: Qualified personnel will be hired, including educators, nutritionists, psychologists and administrative staff. The annual budget for salaries is estimated at \$300,000.



# Nutrition and health

- Food Program: A school meals program will be implemented, with a focus on local and nutritious foods. Approximately \$100,000 dollars will be allocated annually for this program.
- School and Community Gardens: Gardens will be established to teach sustainable agricultural practices and provide fresh food. \$50,000 will be allocated for the development and maintenance of the orchards.

# **Education and culture**

• Curriculum Development: An intercultural and bilingual curriculum will be designed, with a budget

- of \$150,000 dollars for its development and implementation.
- Teacher Training: Continuous training programs will be carried out for educators, with a budget of \$50,000 dollars annually.
- Extracurricular Activities: Activities that promote practical learning and connection with the natural environment will be organized, with a budget of \$30,000 dollars annually.

# **Empowerment and Resilience**

- Workshops and Activities: Workshops on leadership, self-esteem and gender equality will be held, with a budget of \$40,000 dollars annually.
- Psychosocial Support Programs: Counseling and psychological support will be offered, with a budget of \$60,000 dollars annually.

### **Implementation Methodology**

- Planning Phase: Includes conducting feasibility studies, program design and staff training. Estimated duration: 6 months.
- Execution Phase: Implementation of educational, nutritional and wellness programs. Estimated duration: 4 years.
- Evaluation and Adjustment Phase: Continuous evaluation of the program's impact and adjustments as necessary. Duration: Continuous throughout the project.

#### **Evaluation and Monitoring**

- Impact Indicators: Key indicators will be established to evaluate progress in nutrition, education, psychosocial well-being and empowerment.
- Monitoring Systems: Monitoring systems will be implemented to collect and analyze data on program performance and impact.

#### Sustainability

- Training Community Leaders: Community members will be trained to ensure the long-term sustainability of the center.
- Seeking Continued Funding: Strategies will be established to obtain additional funds and continued support from donors and partners.

This methodological approach ensures that the 'Heroes of Tomorrow' Center not only addresses the immediate needs of Ticuna children, but also establishes the foundation for



long-term sustainable and resilient development in the community.

# NUTRITION STRATEGY FOR THE INDIGENOUS CHILD DEVELOPMENT CENTER 'HEROES OF TOMORROW'

#### General objective

Improve nutritional status and promote healthy eating habits in 500 Ticuna indigenous children, ages 5 to 12, through an integrated approach that combines the provision of nutritious foods, nutritional education and sustainable agricultural practices.

#### **Initial Nutritional Evaluation**

Nutritional Diagnosis: Perform nutritional evaluations on all children upon entering the program, using indicators such as Body Mass Index (BMI), height for age and weight for age.

Estimated Budget: \$20,000 dollars to carry out the initial evaluations.

#### **School Feeding Program**

- Balanced Meals: Provide two meals and one snack daily, designed by nutritionists, that meet at least 60% of children's daily nutritional requirements.
- Inclusion of Local Foods: Use locally produced foods, promoting the local economy and ensuring the freshness and quality of the foods.
- Annual Budget: \$150,000 dollars for the purchase of food and operation of the school cafeteria.

#### **Nutritional education**

- Workshops for Children and Families: Organize monthly workshops on nutrition, food hygiene and healthy food preparation, focusing on the use of local products.
- Educational Material: Develop and distribute educational material on nutrition and healthy eating habits.
- Annual Budget: \$30,000 dollars to carry out workshops and produce materials.

# **School and Community Gardens**

• Garden Implementation: Establish gardens at the center and in the community to teach sustainable agriculture practices and provide fresh food.

- Educational Programs: Integrate gardens into the educational curriculum, teaching children about growing food and the importance of a balanced diet.
- Initial Budget: \$50,000 dollars for the establishment of the gardens and \$20,000 dollars annually for their maintenance.

# **Continuous Monitoring and Evaluation**

- Nutritional Monitoring: Conduct periodic nutritional assessments to monitor progress and adjust the program as necessary.
- Success Indicators: Improvement in children's nutritional indicators, increase in knowledge about nutrition and positive changes in eating habits.
- Annual Budget: \$10,000 dollars for program monitoring and evaluation.

#### **Training and Awareness**

- Staff Training: Train center staff, including educators and kitchen staff, in principles of nutrition and safe food handling.
- Community Awareness: Carry out awareness campaigns about the importance of child nutrition and the prevention of diet-related diseases.
- Annual Budget: \$20,000 dollars for training and awareness campaigns.

# Sustainability and Scalability

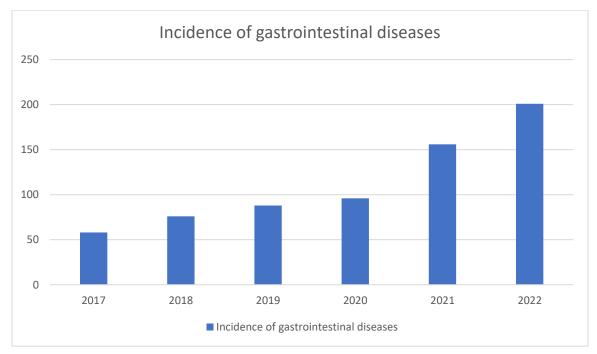
- Alliances with Local Producers: Establish alliances with local producers to ensure a constant supply of fresh, quality food.
- Replicable Model: Develop a school nutrition model that can be replicated in other indigenous communities.

#### **Estimated Total Budget**

The total estimated budget for the implementation and operation of the nutrition strategy during the first five years is approximately \$1,000,000, which includes the construction and maintenance of infrastructure, the operation of the feeding program, nutrition education, and monitoring and assessment.

This nutrition strategy seeks not only to improve the nutritional status of Ticuna children, but also to promote a healthier and more aware community about the importance of a balanced and sustainable diet.





EDUCATIONAL STRATEGY FOR THE INDIGENOUS CHILD DEVELOPMENT CENTER 'HEROES OF TOMORROW'



#### General objective

Develop and execute a comprehensive educational program at the 'Héroes del Mañana' Indigenous Child Development Center, which promotes gender equity, climate change awareness, and environmental justice among 500 Ticuna indigenous children, ages 5 to 12.

#### **Educational Approach and Philosophy**

The strategy is based on an intercultural and bilingual pedagogical approach, which respects and values the Ticuna culture, integrating traditional and contemporary knowledge. Emphasis will be placed on creating an inclusive

and equitable learning environment that encourages the active participation of girls and boys on equal terms.

# **Strategy Components**

# 1. \*\*Intercultural and Bilingual Curriculum\*\*

- Development of a curriculum that incorporates topics of climate change, biodiversity, and sustainable practices, along with Ticuna history and culture.
- Inclusion of educational materials in Ticuna and Spanish languages.
  - Budget for curricular development: \$150,000 dollars.

#### 2. \*\*Teacher Training\*\*

- Continuing training programs for educators in intercultural teaching methods, gender equity and environmental education.
  - Annual professional development workshops.
  - Annual budget for training: \$50,000 dollars.

#### 3. \*\*Gender Equality Education\*\*

- Implementation of specific programs to promote gender equality in the classroom and in the community.
- Activities that encourage leadership and participation of girls.
- Annual budget: \$40,000 dollars.
- 4. \*\*Awareness and Action against Climate Change\*\*



- Workshops and projects that teach about the impact of climate change in the Amazon and the world.
  - Student-led reforestation and conservation initiatives.
- Annual budget for environmental projects: \$60,000 dollars.



# 5. \*\*Environmental Justice and Sustainability\*\*

- Education on environmental rights and sustainable practices.
- Community projects to promote the sustainable management of natural resources.
- Budget for environmental justice initiatives: \$30,000 dollars.

# 6. \*\*Participatory and Experiential Methodologies\*\*

- Use of methodologies that promote active and experiential learning.
- Educational field trips and community-based learning projects.
  - Budget for experiential activities: \$25,000 dollars.

#### **Evaluation and Monitoring**

- Implementation of a continuous evaluation system to measure progress in learning, with special attention to gender equity and understanding of environmental issues.

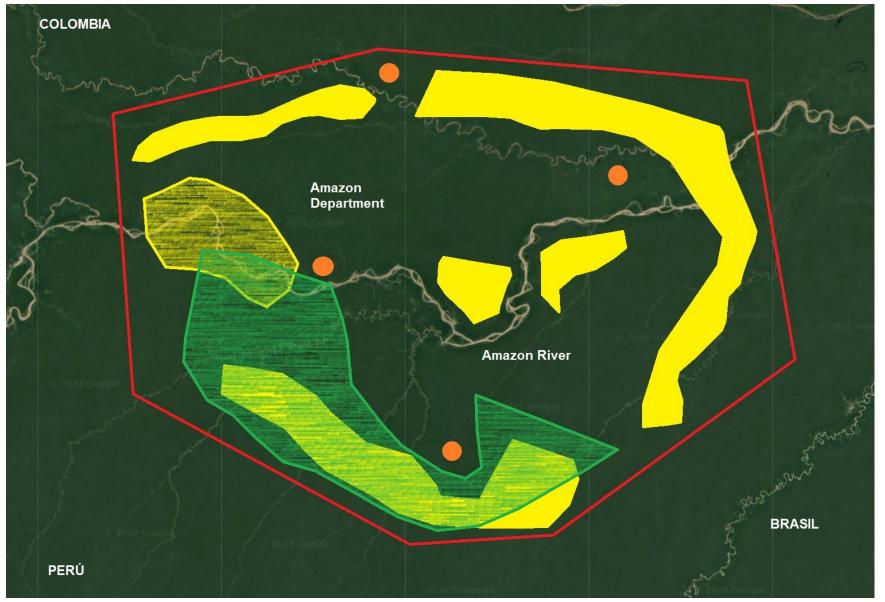
- Indicators of success include improvements in academic performance, increased participation of girls in leadership activities, and increased environmental awareness.
- Annual budget for evaluation: \$20,000 dollars.

# **Community participation**

- Involve families and the community in the educational process, through workshops and community events.
- Promote collaboration between the school and the community to reinforce learning and promote environmental justice.
- Budget for community activities: \$35,000 dollars.

- Development of alliances with educational and environmental organizations to ensure resources and continuous support.
- Documentation and dissemination of best practices to facilitate the replication of the model in other communities.



# **Estimated Total Budget**

The total estimated budget for the implementation and operation of the educational strategy during the first five years is approximately \$1,500,000. This budget covers curriculum development, teacher training, gender equity programs, environmental initiatives, participatory methodologies, evaluation and monitoring, and community participation.

This educational strategy seeks not only to impart knowledge, but also to instill values of respect, equity and environmental responsibility, preparing Ticuna children to be leaders and defenders of their culture and their environment in a constantly changing world.

# SUSTAINABILITY STRATEGY FOR THE INDIGENOUS CHILD DEVELOPMENT CENTER 'HEROES OF TOMORROW'

# General objective

Ensure the long-term viability of the 'Heroes of Tomorrow' Indigenous Child Development Center, ensuring that

nutrition, education and well-being initiatives for 500 Ticuna indigenous children are sustainable, scalable and replicable.

#### **Sustainability Approach**

The strategy focuses on three fundamental pillars: financial sustainability, environmental sustainability and community sustainability, integrating practices that ensure the continuity and lasting impact of the center.

# Financial Sustainability

# **Diversification of Financing Sources**

- Establish a financing mix that includes foundation grants, private donations, government support and collaborations with international NGOs.
- Develop microfinancing programs and corporate sponsorships.
- Budget for development of financing strategies: \$100,000 dollars.

#### **Self-Sustainable Income Models**

- Implement income-generating projects, such as the sale of agricultural products from school gardens and local crafts.
- Create community-managed ecological and cultural tourism programs.
- Initial budget for income projects: \$150,000.
- Environmental sustainability

#### **Ecological and Low Impact Practices**

- Construction and maintenance of infrastructure using sustainable materials and technologies with low environmental impact.
- Implementation of renewable energy systems and efficient water management.
- Budget for sustainable infrastructure: \$200,000 dollars.

#### **Education and Environmental Awareness**

- Integrate environmental education into the curriculum to foster a culture of sustainability and conservation among students and the community.
- Start student-led reforestation and conservation projects.
- Annual budget for environmental education: \$50,000 dollars.

- Participate in sustainable development and indigenous education networks.
- Budget for network development: \$60,000 dollars.

#### Continuous Monitoring, Evaluation and Adjustment

- Implement a monitoring and evaluation system to measure the impact and effectiveness of sustainability strategies.
- Continuously adjust and improve strategies based on results and feedback from the community.
- Annual budget for monitoring and evaluation: \$30,000 dollars.

#### Scalability and Replicability

- Develop a child development center model that can be adapted and replicated in other indigenous communities.
- Document and share lessons learned and best practices at regional, national and international levels.
- Budget for documentation and dissemination: \$40,000 dollars.

#### **Estimated Total Budget**

The total estimated budget to implement the sustainability strategy during the first five years is approximately \$705,000. This budget covers the diversification of financing sources, self-sustaining income projects, sustainable infrastructure, environmental education, community participation, network development, monitoring and evaluation, and model scalability.

This sustainability strategy is designed to ensure that the 'Heroes of Tomorrow' Center not only addresses the current needs of the Ticuna community, but also establishes a lasting legacy that benefits future generations and serves as a model for other indigenous child development initiatives.

# EXPECTED RESULTS OF THE 'HEROES OF TOMORROW' INDIGENOUS CHILD DEVELOPMENT CENTER PROJECT

#### General objective

The main objective of the Indigenous Child Development Center project 'Héroes del Mañana' is to comprehensively improve the quality of life of 500 Ticuna indigenous children, focusing on their nutrition, education, psychosocial well-being and empowerment, within a framework of sustainability and respect for culture and the environment.

### **Specific Results**

- Improvement in the Nutritional Status of Children
- 40% reduction in the prevalence of malnutrition among children served over a 5-year period.
- 60% increase in knowledge and practice of healthy eating habits in the community.
- Establishment of 20 school and community gardens, providing 30% of the food consumed at the center.
